2. APPRENTICESHIP LEVY AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR SCHOOLS

Allison Aargaard was welcomed to the meeting. She work within the Business and Skills Unit at ECC and manage the apprenticeship levy pot for the county council. This includes the management of the apprenticeship levy for those maintained schools that do not have their own bank account, who can tap into the extensive funds that are held by ECC.

Allison noted that quite a high percentage of schools have used apprenticeships, and the levy funding has become easier to access since it was first introduced 7 years ago; there are also a number of grants available to support the costs of the process.

Allison gave a brief explanation of apprenticeships: this is a paid job combined with training, so that employees can "earn as they learn". They range from a Level 2 qualification, equivalent to GCSEs, up to Level 7, equivalent to a Master's Degree. The length of time varies, from 12 months to up to 5 years.

There is no upper age limit, and apprenticeships are suitable for new entrants or members of the existing workforce who are looking to upskill or even change careers.

ECC holds an apprenticeship levy pot, which is accessible by maintained schools that don't have their own bank account. There is no limit to the claim on the pot for these schools.

It was noted that, if a school doesn't pay into the levy at all (because their workforce is too small), they can still take on apprentices aged 16-21, paid for by the Government.

In Essex there is an Apprentice Levy Transfer Service, and employers and businesses are often willing to fund apprenticeships in schools using this levy services.

A Government incentive to use the levy pays £1,000 to any employer taking on a 16-18 year old apprentice, and will pay the employment costs for 19 - 24 year olds who have an EHCP or are Looked After.



The Government has simplified the process somewhat by making the "functional skills" element optional for those over 19, unless the employer wants to include that as a requirement. There is more flexibility around off-job hours, which may be helpful when taking on an apprentice.

The ECC team provides a number of apprenticeships, for example, a new course which is proving popular: the Specialist Teaching Assistant Apprenticeship, at Level 5. There is a requirement that the teaching assistant will have Level 3 so that they have a basic understanding of the skills needed in the role, but this specialist course develops skills around SEND, interventions, teaching support and so on. Specialist Teaching Assistant / Institute for Apprenticeships and Technical Education

As providers the team will do all the paperwork and can even find apprentices (if the school is not using a member of their own workforce).

The Level 6 teacher apprenticeship is not delivered by ECC but schools can still access the levy pot for this course. Other apprenticeships may be suitable for business administration, IT and early years practitioners, for example.

There is an Apprenticeship Support Fund for new apprentices. This is a grant to incentivise employers to take on apprentices of £2,000 (up to two per employer). If the apprentice is a young person, there is the additional payment of £1,000.

It was confirmed that the employer must offer a contract for the length of the apprenticeship but does not have to continue the employment after the apprenticeship. The team will also support both the employer and the apprentice if it isn't working out and can move apprentices to new employers if needed.

Allison stressed that the team is always happy to have a one-on-one discussion with anyone who would like more information or support re accessing their levy account.

3. SMARTPHONE-FREE CHILDHOOD

Jordana Lynch and Geoff Woollgar joined the meeting to talk about their mission, to make schools Smartphone free. Heads and teachers have a uniquely powerful role to play in changing the norm in their school communities. They asserted that when schools act, parents listen. And when schools go smartphone free, it benefits children not just during the school day, but in their wider lives too. Because childhood is too short to be spent on a smartphone.

Smartphones weren't designed with kids in mind – but they've reshaped childhood almost overnight. In the UK, 89% of 12-year-olds now own one, and so do a quarter of children aged 5 to 7. On average, kids get their first smartphone aged nine.

Instead of growing up slowly, children are being pulled into a digital world built to keep them hooked. The impact on their development, mental health and relationships runs deep – and we can't afford to look away any longer.



Compared to any other generation in history, children growing up in the smartphone era spend less time outdoors, less time playing, less time reading, less time moving and more time scrolling, alone.

Just as worryingly, Smartphones mean explicit, violent, and extreme content is only ever a few clicks away, often served up by algorithms when kids aren't looking for it. Once children see these things, they can never be unseen.

Teenage anxiety, depression and self-harm rates have skyrocketed since 2010 – when kids started getting smartphones. Evidence shows a direct link between early smartphone use and declining mental health. The tech giants' business model is simple: the longer kids stay on their platforms, the more money they make. That's why apps are packed with addictive features – and why kids find it so hard to put them down.

The average teen now receives over 200 notifications a day – fragmenting their focus and making it harder to concentrate on schoolwork, hobbies or real-life friendships. Constant distraction is the new normal. Smartphones' addictive design means they can quietly start to take centre stage in family life – causing arguments, battles over screen time, and making it harder to share real, uninterrupted time together. The blue light from screens disrupts melatonin, making it harder to fall asleep, while endless scrolling and late-night notifications keep kids wired when they should be resting.

Arguments and fallouts used to end at the school gate. Now they follow kids home, lingering on their screens day and night – with no safe space to switch off, process or recover. TikTok, Snapchat, and Roblox aren't just playgrounds for kids – they're hunting grounds for predators. They're often used by sexual predators to target children with their first smartphones

Smartphone Free Childhood advocates the following and wants parents, and schools, to sign up to their pact.



Everyone with a stake in the future of the next generation has a role to play to play in this movement. Parents, teachers, health professionals, grandparents, politicians – and young people themselves. Together we must reject the broken narrative that childhood mediated by screens and algorithms is the only way forward.

The paradox of need that keeps us from leaving our schools is a real issue for many and it is so important that we continue to check in within our colleagues who seem particularly under the cosh.

What is to come?

We know about Ofsted but with minimal detail and even Ofsted don't appear to have a clear timeline for the rollout, we know there will be a 'new curriculum', still with too much to do in too little time as we take on more roles that were typically covered under the title of 'adequate parenting' Other than that it is likely that AI might play a bigger role and we and we will probably have more issues to deal with regarding pupil and parent interaction on social and messaging media.

SEND will continue to place a massive strain on school staff and their ability to carry out their job, whilst ensuring excellent results for all children. We know that there are whole cohorts of children in our school that should be attending a setting that frankly hasn't been provided yet. We will all continue to draw support from each other to make sure children AND staff get the best deal.

Like many others I often say this is my favourite half term of the year and then I remember just how many things we have to cram into such a short time.
